

This year the show will have 1,500 tables! They will give over \$20,000 in cash prizes for displays! This will be the official NRA Gun Collectors Show for 2012 and will draw even more dealers, displayers and visitors.

As Gus noted in his display, it is important that collectors ONLY acquire unloaded, inert examples to avoid possible explosive or legal hazards. This was an exceptionally complete exhibit of some very rare items.





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WARNING ABOUT SHOPPING AT GUN SHOWS

Some people hope that P.T. Barnum was right, and that there is a sucker born every minute.

At the last UGCA show, and again at the subsequent Crossroads show in Salt lake there was a table holder from out of state (NOT a UGCA Member!) selling a lot of M1903 Springfield type rifles, including two marked a "M1903A4 Sniper Rifles" with prices around \$3,800 each.

However, the markings on both these rifles appeared to be bogus, and one receiver was not even a military receiver, but one of the cast receivers sold by National Ordnance or other outfits. The seller reportedly insists that these are totally correct and authentic, but anyone foolish enough to buy one will be buying a very expensive education. Replica M1903A4 sniper rifles, honestly described, are being sold for less than \$1,000.

In addition to the fraud and being cheated out of about two-thirds of the value of an item purchased, a collector buying one of these may well decide to totally avoid gun collecting, and think that all collectors are a bunch of crooks.

If you don't know your diamonds you better know your jeweler... Or ask for some expert help.... And a detailed bill of sale.

WARNING ABOUT SHOPPING ON THE INTERNET...

If you ever list anything as "Wanted" you should know that there are scam artists who may contact

you claiming to have the exact item you are looking for. Quite often they will seem to be not know much about the item, but they will almost always insist on getting paid right away, perhaps with a credit card, or money orders.

In a lot of these rip-off attempts, the scammer has no idea what they are purportedly selling, and cannot answer even basic questions, but will insist it is "old and genuine, exactly what you are looking for." Seldom will they have photos, or if they do, the photos are probably copies from some legitimate website. (Your editor had some guy try to sell us a Colt revolver, using photos take from our own website! It was a really good deal though, but since we already owned the gun, we did not fall for their scheme!)

On the other hand there are lots of fine people selling items on auction sites or dealer sites. Check around by using Google and entering the dealer's name and "problems" or reputation and that should give you a clue about what other people think of their business.

Our Officers and Board of Directors work hard to make this and all our shows successful.


Several displays this time were political in content. I contribute this to being an election year '- the most important election year in this nation's history. It is crucial that we replace Obama and get America back on course.



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Collecting Specialties-

Flare Guns and Signal Pistols



Flare guns and signal pistol have been around in various forms since at least the 1860s and have been used all around the world for military use to signal troops to take some action, or to communicate some message, or by mariners in distress at sea, and sometimes just for Fourth of July type fireworks.

These guns come in many sizes, with most in the 12 gauge, 1 inch or 37mm size. They have been made from brass, aluminum, steel, and even plastic. Many are military but many are commercial for nautical or recreational use. Most are single barrel guns, but some have two or even three barrels.


Under federal law, flare guns are NOT subject to all the usual regulatory hassles imposed on traditional guns.

Prices are pretty modest (actually CHEAP!) with many late production guns selling in the \$50 to \$100 range, and even most of the common older WW2 vintage guns sell for \$100-200.

There is not a lot of good printed reference material on the subject. Most is buried in obscure manuals, but the best single volume coverage is Robert Gaynor's FLARE GUNS & SIGNAL PISTOLS: THEIR USE, DESCRIPTION AND ACCESSORIES, a soft cover 178 page book covering 96 different guns with dimensions and



some historical background and information on maker and a good drawing of the item. Besides the guns, Gaynor covers 29 holster or carrying kits, and 19 different types of cartridges, along with a 10 page table with more detailed info on cartridges so there is plenty for a collector to chase to keep interested.
